Match background

Valencia CF's defeat of Bayer 04 Leverkusen last time out – their first victory in seven UEFA Champions League outings – cut their Group E deficit behind the German side to just a single point and they will be hoping to overtake them on matchday five when KRC Genk come to Mestalla.

- The game in Belgium on 13 September – the teams' first competitive meeting – finished 0-0.
- Valencia then drew 1-1 at home to Chelsea FC but a 2-1 matchday three defeat at Leverkusen left their hopes hanging by a thread. Jonas scored the second fastest UEFA Champions League goal to set Valencia on the way to a vital 3-1 win against the Bundesliga club last time out, however, bringing them right back into contention.
- On matchday two Genk went down 2-0 at Leverkusen and were then handed a sobering UEFA Champions League lesson as they lost 5-0 at Chelsea. Some pride was restored back in Belgium with a 1-1 draw against the London team, Jelle Vossen wiping out the visitors' early goal and László Köteles pulling off a superb save from David Luiz's spot kick.

Previous meetings

- Valencia lost their first home game against opponents from Belgium in a competitive fixture, going down 2-1 in the 1982/83 UEFA Cup quarter-final first leg against RSC Anderlecht and 5-2 overall. However their other four encounters have resulted in three wins and a draw.
- Genk have yet to win in a total of five matches against Spanish opponents but four of those encounters ended all square. The exception was the away game with Real Madrid CF in the 2002/03 UEFA Champions League group stage which they lost 6-0.

Match background

- Genk, who failed to win a game during their only previous UEFA Champions League participation in 2002/03, have this and the home game with Leverkusen on 6 December to try and open their account in the group stage.

Team ties

- Jeroen Simaeys was in the Club Brugge KV team that drew 1-1 away to Valencia in the 2008/09 UEFA Cup group stage.
- Anthony Vanden Borre's RSC Anderlecht lost 2-0 in Valencia in the UEFA Champions League group stage on 14 September 2004.
- Vanden Borre was also part of the Belgium team that lost both FIFA World Cup qualifiers to Spain in October 2008 (1-2) and September 2009 (0-5) as well as the 2-0 World Cup qualifying reverse in October 2005, which also featured Thomas Buffel and David Albelda. Albelda was also involved in the 2-0 home win for Spain against Buffel's Belgium a year earlier.
- Elyaniv Barda was a member of the Maccabi Haifa FC side which lost 4-0 at home to Valencia in the second round of the 2003/04 UEFA Cup, a competition the Spanish side went on to win.
- Pablo Hernández struck two extra-time goals against Club Brugge to send Valencia into the 2009/10 UEFA Europa League round of 16. Éver Banega, Albelda, Miguel, Ángel Dealbert and Hedwiges Maduro were also involved in Valencia's 3-0 second-leg win at Mestalla.
- Adil Rami played in the first leg of LOSC Lille Métropole's 2-1 UEFA Europa League play-off triumph at Genk in August 2009, part of a 6-3 aggregate success.
- Mehmet Topal came on as a substitute in Turkey's 1-1 UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying draw away to Belgium on 3 June. The midfielder also featured in a World Cup qualifier against the Red Devils that finished 1-1 in September 2008.

- Jonas' goal on matchday four was timed at 10.84 seconds, the second fastest in UEFA Champions League history behind FC Bayern München's Roy Makaay, who struck after 10.12 seconds against Real Madrid CF on 7 March 2006.

- Valencia's four-match winning run ended as Madrid became the first side to beat them at Mestalla this season.
- On 5 November Tino Costa struck his first goal in 20 games for club and country, since 6 February, as Valencia won 2-0 at Levante UD.
- Soldado has registered 22 times in his last 25 outings, although he has only scored five in his last 12 games.
- Valencia will play third-tier side Cádiz CF in the Copa del Rey round of 32 on 13 and 21 December.

Injury news

- Ricardo Costa did not face Madrid after tearing his left hamstring in training on 11 November.
- Banega has been ruled out of the remainder of the group stage after straining knee ligaments on matchday four.
- Sergio Canales is expected to be sidelined until April after partially tearing a right knee ligament on 23 October.
- Hedwiges Maduro is likely to be out of action until February after tearing ankle ligaments while training with the Netherlands at the start of October.

International duty

- Jérémy Mathieu made his international debut as France claimed a 1-0 friendly victory over the United States on 11 November; Adil Rami also featured in Paris.
- Jonas scored both goals – his first at international level – as Brazil beat Egypt 2-0 in Doha on 14 November; he also started the 2-0 triumph away to Gabon four days earlier.
- Jordi Alba, who made his Spain bow in their 3-1 UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying victory against Scotland on 11 October, started the Roja's 1-0 friendly defeat by England on 12 November.
- Sofiane Feghouli was called up to the Algeria squad for the first time for the friendly with Tunisia, but did not feature.

Miscellaneous

- Saturday's Madrid game was the first on the new pitch at Mestalla, relaid after matchday four.

- Mario Been's side extended their unbeaten league run to four matches with victory over a Westerlo side who had Stef Wils sent off on 12 minutes.
- Anele Ngongca was left out after returning late from international duty. Stef Peeters made his debut as a late substitute, while Elyaniv Barda marked his first league start in two months with a goal.
- Jelle Vossen has scored in each of Genk's last four games, taking his tally to 11 in all competitions this season.

- On 5 November Anthony Limbombe, 17, struck an 89th-minute equaliser – his first league goal – as Genk drew 2-2 with KV Kortrijk.
- Genk had lost five of their previous six games before recovering from 4-2 down to beat Club Brugge KV 5-4 on 29 October. Kevin De Bruyne scored his first professional hat-trick in Bruges.
- Genk are on 23 points in the First League; at this stage last term they had 30 and were two points clear at the summit.
- Fifteen of the 20 league goals Genk have conceded this season have come in the second half of games.
- Been took the reins on 30 August, 12 days after Frank Vercauteren's departure for United Arab Emirates outfit Al-Jazira Club. Pierre Denier led the side in the interim.
- Dániel Tózsér struck the only goal as Genk claimed their first Belgian Super Cup at the sixth attempt on 21 July, beating R. Standard de Liège despite playing over an hour with ten men after Vossen's dismissal.

Injury news

- Abel Masuero has been out since picking up a calf muscle injury in training on 25 October.
- David Hubert (stomach, out since 28 September) and Jeroen Simaey (broken toe, 5 October) have been sidelined.
- Torben Joneleit could be out until April after tearing knee ligaments against KV Mechelen on 27 August.

International duty

- Pudil started as the Czech Republic beat Montenegro 2-0 in the first leg of their UEFA EURO 2012 play-off tie on 11 November, dropping to the bench four days later as his team completed a 3-0 aggregate win.
- Anthony Vanden Borre made his first start for Belgium in over two years in a 2-1 friendly victory against Romania on 11 November. De Bruyne and Vossen came on as second-half substitutes, and the latter started the 0-0 draw away to France four days later.

Miscellaneous

- Marvin Ogunjimi, who was due to join RCD Mallorca on 7 December, has been released to the Spanish club early.

Playing career: Real Sociedad de Fútbol, CD Toledo, Racing de Ferrol, CD Leganés, Lorca Deportiva CF

Coaching career: Lorca Deportiva CF, UD Almería, Valencia CF

- The son and grandson of famous goalkeepers, Unai Emery took his first steps as a footballer in the youth ranks at Real Sociedad, where he played as a left-sided midfielder.
- Failing to shine with the first team at Real, Emery went on to carve out a career in the lower leagues with Toledo, Ferrol, Leganés and Lorca but was eventually forced to retire at 33 having suffered a knee injury.
- He was immediately offered the chance to coach Lorca – the club with whom he had ended his playing career – and took them up to the second division in his first season in charge, 2004/05.
- After coming close to taking Lorca into the Spanish top flight the following season, was appointed by UD Almería ahead of the 2006/07 campaign and duly won promotion to the Liga.
- Almería shone among the Spanish elite, finishing the season in eighth place while their manager's reputation soared, earning him a call to replace Ronald Koeman at Valencia, whom he guided to third place in the Liga in both 2009/10 and 2010/11.

KRC Genk: Mario Been

Date of birth: 11 December 1963

Nationality: Dutch

Playing career: Feyenoord, Pisa Calcio, Roda JC, sc Heerenveen, FC Tirol Innsbruck, SBV Excelsior

Coaching career: Feyenoord (assistant), SBV Excelsior, Trinidad & Tobago (assistant), NEC Nijmegen, Feyenoord, KRC Genk

- Developed in Feyenoord's youth department, the attacking midfielder played in the first team from 1982; his greatest success came in 1984 when he helped the Rotterdam giants, whose side included Johan Cruyff and Ruud Gullit, to the Dutch double, also winning the country's Talent of the Year prize and making his only appearance for the Netherlands in a friendly against Austria.
- As a skilled playmaker who also possessed a powerful shot, he earned the nickname Mariodona at Feyenoord; left in 1988 for Pisa, and had spells with Roda, Heerenveen and Tirol Innsbruck before ending his career in 1995 back in Rotterdam with Excelsior.
- In 2000 he became Bert van Marwijk's assistant at Feyenoord, winning the UEFA Cup in 2002; left in 2004 and the following year took over at Excelsior, whom he guided to promotion as second division champions in his first season.
- Worked as Leo Beenhakker's assistant with Trinidad & Tobago at the 2006 FIFA World Cup before taking charge of NEC, leading the club to fifth place in the Eredivisie in 2007/08 and reaching the round of 32 of the following season's UEFA Cup.
- Unable to resist the lure of Feyenoord, where he returned in summer 2009; finished fourth and reached the Dutch Cup final in his first season but his second campaign included a club record 10-0 defeat by PSV Eindhoven. Been stepped down in July 2011 but was back in football the following month, taking charge of Genk.

- Born in the town of Flers in north-west France on 23 April 1972, Tony Chapron has been a referee since 1998 and within eight years had made the step up to Ligue 1.
- His first UEFA engagement came at the 2001 UEFA Regions' Cup, where he took charge of four games including the final between Braga AMA and Moravia AMA.
- Chapron, who now resides in Grenoble where he works as an education adviser and is father to two daughters, took charge of four games in the 2008/09 UEFA Cup, including the fixture between Hamburger SV and NEC Nijmegen in the round of 32.
- Selected for the 2009 UEFA European Under-21 Championship, Chapron oversaw two matches in Sweden and acted as fourth official at the group game between Germany and England, a forerunner of the eventual final.
- Went on to referee five fixtures in the inaugural UEFA Europa League the following season, subsequently overseeing the UEFA EURO 2012 qualifier between Northern Ireland and Italy in October 2010. The following month started with his refereeing debut in the UEFA Champions League group stage as FC Rubin Kazan took on Panathinaikos FC.

UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

- Holders FC Barcelona have avoided becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).
- In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.
- No team has successfully defended the UEFA Champions League trophy with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the last club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), AFC Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on matchday one at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on matchday six.
- Ryan Giggs is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 289 days, in Manchester United's 1-1 draw at SL Benfica on 14 September 2011.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua București on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg BK on 1 October 1997.
- Barcelona and Manchester United FC have both finished as group winners on 12 occasions, one more than Real Madrid.
- Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).
- Twelve teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including MŠK Žilina and FK Partizan in 2010/11. The other ten are: Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC (2009/10), FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), Anderlecht (2004/05), Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).
- Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.
- MŠK Žilina conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2010/11, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Debrecen (2009/10), Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06), Villarreal CF (2005/06) and Manchester United (2010/11) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on matchday three of the same campaign.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer 04 Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and SV Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
