## Match background

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Club Brugge and Monaco are both already six points off the pace in Group A, and each will know the importance of registering a first win in the section as they meet in Belgium.

- Both teams have been beaten by Borussia Dortmund and Atlético Madrid – level at the top of the section with six points apiece – and need three points at the Jan Breydelstadion to belatedly kick-start their campaign.
- However, both sides are on long winless runs in the UEFA Champions League; indeed, Club Brugge have lost their last eight matches in the competition proper.
- Monaco are under new management for this game, Leonardo Jardim having departed on 11 October; two days later, the club appointed former striker Thierry Henry as his replacement, his first job as a head coach.

### Previous meetings

- The sides' only past contests came in the 1988/89 European Cup second round, when each were home winners. However, while Club Brugge took the advantage with a 1-0 success in the first leg in Belgium, Monaco turned the tie round in style back in France, a Youssouf Fofana hat-trick helping secure a 6-1 second-leg win.
- The first leg of that tie took place on 26 October 1988 – two days short of 30 years before this matchday three fixture.

### Form guide

#### Club Brugge

- Beaten 1-0 at home by Dortmund on matchday one, Club Brugge went down 3-1 at Atlético last time out to extend their run of defeats in the UEFA Champions League, group stage to final, to eight in a row – four short of the competition record held by another Belgian club, Anderlecht.
- Belgian champions for the 15th time in 2017/18, this is Club Brugge's second group campaign in three seasons, and their sixth overall. Before 2016/17 – when they lost every game to finish bottom of a group including Leicester, Porto and København – their previous participation had come in 2005/06.
- The Belgian side are without a win in their last 12 UEFA Champions League fixtures, qualifying included (D1 L11).
- Group stage to final, Club Brugge's last win in the competition was a 3-2 home defeat of Rapid Wien in November 2005; their record since then is D1 L9. They have won only two of their last 14 fixtures in the UEFA Champions League proper (D1 L11).
- Club Brugge's last meetings with French opposition came in the 2012/13 UEFA Europa League group stage, when they lost away (0-4) and home (1-2) to Bordeaux.
- The defeat by Bordeaux in Bruges ended a three-match unbeaten run at home to French visitors (W2 D1). Overall, Club Brugge's record against Ligue 1 sides in Belgium is W5 D1 L4.
- Runners-up to Liverpool in 1978, Club Brugge remain the only team from Belgium to have reached a European Cup final.

#### Monaco

- Having opened with a 2-1 home defeat against Atlético, Monaco went down 3-0 in Dortmund on matchday two – extending their run of European away games without a win to five (D2 L3).
- Second in Ligue 1 last season, Monaco reached the 2016/17 UEFA Champions League semi-finals but finished bottom of their 2017/18 group having collected two points from their six games.
- Monaco drew two of their three away games in 2017/18, losing the other; a 3-2 win at Dortmund in the 2016/17 quarter-final first leg is their sole success in their last nine European away fixtures (D3 L5).
- Monaco are without a win in ten European games (D2 L8), since a 3-1 home victory against Dortmund in the quarter-final second leg in April 2017.
- The Ligue 1 outfit's last trip to Belgium brought a 1-1 draw at Anderlecht in the 2015/16 UEFA Europa League group stage; Monaco went on to lose the home game 2-0.
- The 1988 defeat at Club Brugge is Monaco's only loss in Belgium in three visits (W1 D1).
- Runners-up in 2004, Monaco remain the last French team to reach the UEFA Champions League final.

### Links and trivia

- Henry spent two years as an assistant and forwards coach to the Belgium national team before taking up the head coach role at Monaco; Club Brugge's Hans Vanaken featured in several Belgium squads during that period.
- Monaco midfielder Yuri Tielemans was an Anderlecht player between 2013 and 2017, winning two league titles.

- Nacer Chadli was born in Liege and was in the youth teams at Thier-à-Liège, Standard Liège and MVV Maastricht before making his senior breakthrough at Dutch side AGOVV Apeldoorn. He has never played senior club football in his homeland.

- Arnaut Groeneveld scored the Netherlands' goal in a 1-1 friendly draw with Belgium on 16 October; Tielemans and Chadli were in the Belgium side, with Vanaken and Mechele unused substitutes.
- Monaco general manager Filip Dhondt held the same role at Club Brugge between 2001 and 2010.

## Latest news

### Club Brugge

- The Belgian champions won eight of their first nine league games this season, drawing the other, before a 3-1 defeat at Standard Liège on 7 October. They were held 1-1 at home by Waasland-Beveren on Friday.
- Club Brugge won the Belgian Super Cup for the 15th time on 22 July in their own Jan Breydelstadion, beating Standard 2-1 with goals from Hans Vanaken and Wesley.
- Club Brugge's Belgian Cup campaign ended in the last 32, with a 2-0 defeat at amateur side Deinze on 26 September.
- Arnaut Groeneveld made his Netherlands debut as a substitute in the 3-0 UEFA Nations League victory against Germany on 13 October; three days later, he marked his first start with the equaliser in a 1-1 friendly draw against Belgium.
- Matej Mitrović scored Croatia's second goal in a 2-1 friendly win against Jordan on 15 October.
- Rezaei Kaveh missed matchday one with a knee problem and has not played since.\*

### Monaco

- Monaco were beaten 4-0 by Paris Saint-Germain in the Trophée des Champions on 4 August.
- Monaco have won only one of their 13 matches this season, the 3-1 success at Nantes on the opening day of Ligue 1 on 11 August. They have lost nine, including eight of the last ten and four in a row before Leonardo Jardim's departure.
- Thierry Henry's reign as Jardim's replacement also got off to a losing start as a result of Saturday's 2-1 reverse at Strasbourg.
- Monaco have six points after ten Ligue 1 games in 2018/19, 16 less than at the same stage last season. This represents their worst start to a season since 1953/54, when they had five points after ten matches.
- Radamel Falcao scored twice in the club's last five fixtures under Jardim – the only Monaco player to find the net during that period. He limped off shortly before half-time at Strasbourg having suffered a thigh injury.
- Falcao and Youri Tielemans – who failed to find the net in 27 Ligue 1 outings last season – have scored Monaco's last six league goals between them, three apiece. Tielemans scored a late consolation penalty at Strasbourg.
- Substitute Samuel Grandsir was sent off one minute and 51 seconds after his introduction at Strasbourg.
- Danijel Subašić came on as a substitute on matchday two having not played since the FIFA World Cup final on 15 July due to a hamstring injury while Stevan Jovetić was out between 18 August and 7 October with a calf complaint.
- Rony Lopes suffered a hamstring injury in training with Portugal in early September and has not played since; Kevin Ndoram is expected to be sidelined for up to four weeks with an elbow injury.

## Head coach

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### Ivan Leko

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**Date of birth:** 7 February 1978

**Nationality:** Croatian

**Playing career:** Hajduk Split (twice), Trogir (loan), Málaga, Club Brugge, Germinal Beerschot (loan), Lokeren

**Coaching career:** OH Leuven, PAOK (assistant), Sint Truiden, Club Brugge

- Launched his career with home-town club Hajduk in 1996 as a midfielder who could play on the left or in the centre, and scored 30 goals at a rate of almost one every four games over five seasons in the Croatian First Division, winning the domestic cup in 1999/2000 and claiming the league title in his final year at the club.
- Joined Málaga in summer 2001 and, although he never repeated his prolific scoring rate in Spain, quickly became an important member of the side. In four seasons Leko played over 100 Liga and UEFA Cup games, helping the side win a UEFA Intertoto Cup in 2002.
- Returned to Hajduk on loan halfway through 2004/05, scoring three goals in 14 games in another Croatian championship success, before signing for Club Brugge. Leko, who won 13 caps for Croatia and was a non-playing squad member at the 2006 FIFA World Cup, made an immediate impact in Belgium, scoring 12 minutes into his debut against Excelsior Mouscron and quickly setting up Croatia team-mate Boško Balaban for a second.
- His time in Bruges brought 21 league goals over three and a half years, and the 2006/07 Belgian Cup, before he joined Germinal Beerschot in January 2009. Moved on to Lokeren 12 months later, winning another cup in 2011/12 before hanging up his boots in February 2014 to become coach at OH Leuven.
- Unable to prevent relegation from the top flight, Leko went on to have spells at PAOK as an assistant coach to compatriot Igor Tudor and Sint Truiden in 2016/17 before taking over from Michel Preud'homme at former side Club Brugge in summer 2017. The Blue-Blacks led the table throughout the season, lifting the title with a game to spare in the championship play-offs, with Leko named Belgium's coach of the year.

### Thierry Henry

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**Date of birth:** 17 August 1977

- One of Europe's most feared strikers in recent times, Thierry Henry accepted his first head coach position at former club Monaco in October 2018 after two years as an assistant to Roberto Martínez with Belgium.
- Born in a Paris suburb, Henry first joined Monaco in 1992 after a stint at the famed Clairefontaine academy. Broke into the ASM first team in August 1994 and named French young player of the year in 1996; the following year, scored nine goals in the club's Ligue 1 triumph and also helped Monaco to the UEFA Champions League semi-finals in 1997/98.
- After a brief, unhappy spell at Juventus in 1999, signed for Arsenal – linking up again with his former Monaco coach Arsène Wenger, who converted Henry from a winger to a central striker. Went on to become the Gunners' all-time top scorer with 228 goals, winning the league and cup double in 2001/02 and adding another Premier League title two years later as the attacking spearhead of the 'Invincibles'.
- Captain of the Arsenal side beaten by Barcelona in the 2006 UEFA Champions League final, Henry switched to the Blaugrana in 2007, winning two league titles in three years in Spain including a historic treble also comprising the UEFA Champions League and Copa del Rey in 2008/09. Wound down his playing career with four and a half years at the New York Red Bulls, including an emotional loan return to Arsenal in 2011/12, before hanging up his boots in 2014.
- Finished as France's top scorer in the 1998 FIFA World Cup triumph with three goals, and registered the same total in the victorious UEFA EURO 2000 campaign. Henry also scored three times as France again reached the World Cup final in 2006, and retired from international football after the 2010 tournament with 123 caps and a record 51 goals.

## Competition facts

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### UEFA Champions League: Did you know?

#### Overall records

- In 2012/13, Chelsea became the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage). In 1992/93, Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and lost 4-3 on aggregate in the second round to CSKA Moskva.
- In 2016/17 Real Madrid became the first team to successfully defend the UEFA Champions League trophy, with AC Milan (1989, 1990) the previous club to win consecutive European Cups. Milan (1994, 1995), Ajax (1995, 1996), Juventus (1996, 1997) and Manchester United (2008, 2009) have all returned to the UEFA Champions League final as holders only to lose.
- Real Madrid then made it three wins in a row in 2017/18, becoming the fourth club to win three or more successive titles in European Cup history, and the first to do it twice.
- Only two teams have ever won the UEFA Champions League on home soil: Borussia Dortmund (1997, final in Munich) and Juventus (1996, final in Rome), while Manchester United lost the 2011 final in London and 12 months later Bayern were beaten in the showpiece in their own stadium, the Fußball Arena München.

#### Group stage

- Barcelona have finished as group winners on 19 occasions, four more than Real Madrid and Manchester United and five more than Bayern München.
- Bayern München (2 April 2013 to 27 November 2013) and Real Madrid (23 April 2014 to 18 February 2015) jointly hold the record for successive wins in the UEFA Champions League proper with ten. Bayern surpassed the previous mark of nine, set by Barcelona between 18 September 2002 and 18 February 2003.
- Six teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain (1994/95), Spartak Moskva (1995/96), Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage) and Real Madrid (2011/12 and 2014/15).
- Twenty teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, most recently Benfica in 2017/18.
- In 2017/18, Paris Saint-Germain set a new group stage record by scoring 25 goals, with Liverpool (23) also eclipsing the old mark of 21 set by Borussia Dortmund in 2016/17. Manchester United (1998/99), Barcelona (2011/12, 2016/17) and Real Madrid (2013/14) all managed 20.
- Only Deportivo La Coruña (2004/05), Maccabi Haifa (2009/10) and Dinamo Zagreb (2016/17) have failed to score in a group stage.
- BATE Borisov conceded 24 goals in 2014/15, a new group stage record which was matched by Legia Warszawa in 2016/17. The previous mark, 22, was held by Dinamo Zagreb (2011/12) and Nordsjælland (2012/13); Malmö shipped 21 in 2015/16.
- No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea (2005/06), Liverpool (2005/06), Villarreal (2005/06), Manchester United (2010/11), Monaco (2014/15), Paris Saint-Germain (2015/16) and Barcelona (2017/18) all let in just one.
- Before their 3-1 win against Sporting CP on matchday six of the 2006/07 campaign, Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, a mark FCSB surpassed on matchday six in 2013/14.
- Anderlecht hold the unwanted record for successive defeats in the competition, group stage to final, having lost 12 in a row between December 2003 and November 2005. Dinamo Zagreb are next with 11 consecutive losses on two occasions, from September 2011 to November 2012 and ongoing since September 2015.
- The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is six points: Zenit in 2013/14 and Roma in 2015/16. Since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, eight teams have made it through with seven points: Legia Warszawa (1995/96), Dynamo Kyiv (1999/2000), Liverpool (2001/02), Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus (both 2002/03), Rangers and Werder Bremen (2005/06) and Basel (2014/15).
- Napoli failed to qualify from their group with 12 points in 2013/14, the highest total of any team not to reach the next stage when the top two in each section progressed. Dynamo Kyiv (1999/2000), Borussia Dortmund (2002/03 – both second group stage), PSV Eindhoven (2003/04), Olympiacos and Dynamo Kyiv (both 2004/05), Werder Bremen (2006/07), Manchester City (2011/12), Chelsea and Cluj (both 2012/13), Benfica (2013/14) and Porto (2015/16) all

missed out with ten points.

### **Goalscoring records**

- Lionel Messi became the first player to score five goals in a match in Barcelona's 7-1 win against Bayer Leverkusen on 7 March 2012, a feat matched by Shakhtar Donetsk's Luiz Adriano at BATE Borisov on 21 October 2014. Eleven more players, also including Messi, have scored four times in a game, most recently Cristiano Ronaldo for Real Madrid on matchday six in 2015/16.
- Cristiano Ronaldo set a new record for a UEFA Champions League group stage with 11 goals in 2015/16, eclipsing his own mark of nine in 2013/14, which Luiz Adriano matched in 2014/15 and Ronaldo himself equalled in 2017/18. Lionel Messi got ten goals in 2016/17; Zlatan Ibrahimović (2013/14), Ruud van Nistelrooy (2004/05), Filippo Inzaghi and Hernán Crespo (both 2002/03) managed eight.
- Messi's hat-trick against PSV Eindhoven on matchday one of the 2018/19 competition was his eighth in the competition, one more than Ronaldo.

### **Oldest and youngest players**

- Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta is the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League having featured against Real Madrid on matchday six in 2007/08 aged 43 years and 252 days. Alessandro Costacurta is the oldest outfield player; the Milan defender was 40 years and 211 days when he played against AEK Athens in 2006/07.
- Francesco Totti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 38 years and 59 days, in Roma's 1-1 draw at CSKA Moskva on 25 November 2014. Ryan Giggs (37 years 290 days) was the previous record holder.
- Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared; he was 16 years and 87 days when he started for Anderlecht against Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was sent off in the 37th minute.
- Peter Ofori-Quaye is the youngest player to have scored in the UEFA Champions League, aged 17 years and 195 days. He found the net in Olympiacos's 5-1 defeat at Rosenborg on 1 October 1997.
